Nomination letter regarding the PhD thesis by Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen.

On behalf of the Department of Psychology and Behavioural Sciences I hereby nominate Post-doctoral Fellow Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen for AUFF's Ph.D. award 2017. During her Ph.D Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen published three articles in international peer-reviewed journals and presented her research at seven conferences currently obtaining an h-index of 2 and 19 citations.

Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen holds a master's degree in psychology from Aarhus University, achieved in 2012 (GPA 9.0). Before studying psychology Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen worked for nine years organizing and designing public campaigns (e.g., anti-smoking). Her experience of gender-differentiated challenges in work-life balance sparked an interest in psychology.

While studying psychology Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen and her family moved to Qatar as expatriates for 2 years. With contacts in to both Scandinavia and Middle East Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen saw a unique opportunity to investigate potential differences in the interaction between culture and gender.

At Qatar University she was offered a position as research assistant under the head of Social Sciences, working on gender studies within the field of anthropology. She left Qatar with a recommendation for a Ph.D. stipend. From 2012 to 2015 Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen held a Ph.D. fellowship at the Department of Psychology and Behavioural Sciences, Aarhus University.

During her Ph.D. fellowship Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen was a member of CON AMORE's conference committee planning an international conference. She was chair of the PhD candidates at the Department of Psychology and Behavioural Sciences and represented them at the department forum. In 2013 she returned to Qatar University for data collection and in 2014 she was invited by a top researcher within the field of Neurobiology of Learning and Memory to spend 3 months as a visiting researcher at University of California Irvine.

After her defence Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen was hired as a Postdoctoral Fellow, at the work and organisational unit, Department of Psychology and Behavioural Sciences. Facilitated by Aarhus University's mentor scheme "Empower Talent" she entered an interdisciplinary collaboration with Dr. Helle Neergaard, Department of Management at AU. With a focus on gender, Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen seeks to use her knowledge of cognition across cultures as a foundation for new studies that will advance our understanding of diversity in management.

The PhD thesis

Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen's PhD dissertation examines differences in autobiographical memory, goal conceptions, and life scripts between a Scandinavian and a Middle Eastern cul-

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ture and how these differences interact with gender. This research focus is original and timely. The dissertation consists of three articles (all published, or in press, in respected international, peer reviewed journals). One common thread in this series of articles is that gender differences are especially pronounced in the Middle Eastern sample, and that Middle Eastern men differ from both Middle Eastern women and Scandinavian men and women by being more reliant on cultural norms and religious values. This has implications for their perception of goals and goal values, their tolerance of personal unhappiness in the pursuit of culturally sanctioned goals and their internationalized “life script” – that is, their representation of significant life events and their timing. These findings have important theoretical implications in relation to understanding cultural differences and their effects on basic psychological phenomena, such as goal perceptions and planning. The findings also have important societal implications, by informing some of the challenges associated with immigration and migration.

Overall, the dissertation holds several novel contributions to the literature.

First, it has produced unique data on a rarely studied population, that is, a Middle Eastern population. Most studies on cultural differences in autobiographical memory focus on Western versus Asian populations, probably due to difficulties with accessing other Non-Western cultures. Through her contacts and collaboration with researchers at Qatar University, Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen was able to conduct independent data collections within Qatar with participation of both male and female students. This accomplishment bears witness to her open-minded attitude as a researcher, her excellent organizational skills and her deep respect for diversity, all important talents and attitudes in a rapidly changing world. As a result, her thesis provides the first study of cultural life scripts, and goal perceptions in a traditional Middle Eastern Muslim population.

Second, through the skilled data-analyses and thoughtful theoretical interpretations of the findings, Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen extended the study on autobiographical memory and related concepts to the area of cultural differences. She showed how some of the methodological developments she accomplished as part of her thesis can be used to attain a deeper understanding of profound cultural differences in our way of conceiving the past and future.

There is no doubt that Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen through these contributions and their timeliness has left an important mark on the field. In addition to her published articles, she has given several speeches at international conferences, in more occasions in the form of an invited symposia talk. She is an excellent speaker and teacher in addition to being a talented, creative and courageous young researcher. For these reasons, I warmly recommend Christina Lundsgaard Ottsen as a recipient of the AUFF's Ph.D. award 2017
