The Arizona Roadmap to Veteran Employment is a statewide plan that engages public and private sector organizations with a goal of connecting service members, veterans and their family members to employment opportunities, training & resources.



This checklist is a tool for service members, veterans and their family members to use when looking for employment. Completing this checklist can help you clarify where you are now and possible next steps in your job search. If you are working with an employment service provider or program, you can also show this to the person you are working with to give them a better idea of what programs or resources might be a good fit.

There are many resources available to assist you with this process. The better you understand how your military experience relates, the better you will be able to share that with a potential employer.</p>

Put the necessary time in to making sure it best represents what you bring to the table as a potential employee.</p> <p>Your resume should only be considered complete once you have had other people review and proofread it. One typo in your resume may make the difference between becoming a candidate or not! And tailoring your resume for a specific position can help you stand out.</p>

This is best done before you even receive a call to schedule an interview. Consider all the elements listed as you prepare.</p>
