SAN MATEO COUNTY

San Mateo County is committed to supporting youth and children, and to improving the quality of life for every family in our community. We are dedicated to providing our more than 160,000 residents under age 18¹ with the resources and support they need to become healthy, productive members of our community.

San Mateo County's two-year budget for fiscal 2013 – 2015 allocates more than **half a billion dollars**² for programs that directly benefit our children and their families. This report shows how these funds are allocated, providing a full range of services for children, youth and families across the spectrum of county programs.

In 2010, San Mateo County produced its first Children, Youth and Families budget. This innovative budget represents a new way to analyze public spending, by counting the dollars spent on youth and families across every County department, and showing how the county leverages state and federal funding. The Children, Youth and Families budget also serves as a comprehensive guide to local programs and services for children, youth and families.

The criteria used to define children, youth and family programs are as follows:

- “Children” and “youth” are defined as persons under age 18. However, some programs for Foster Youth serve clients up to age 21. When program spending for youth under age 18 cannot be separated from spending on clients up to age 21, the entire program cost is included.
- Spending for programs where adults receive money based on the presence of a child or youth, are included.
- Spending for programs that benefit the general public, even if those programs benefit children and youth, are not included.
- Programs that indirectly benefit children and youth are not included.
- Capital projects are not included.

San Mateo County’s Shared Vision 2025, a community-generated blueprint for the County’s future, sets our community sights on achieving a Collaborative, Prosperous, Healthy and Safe, Livable and Environmentally Conscious community, by the year 2025. In the following pages, you will find details of selected programs and services organized by these outcome areas.

BILL OF RIGHTS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH OF SAN MATEO COUNTY

Adopted by the Board of Supervisors in 2008, the Bill of Rights for Children and Youth serves as a statement of commitment and vision for providing services to children and youth in San Mateo County. This document, written in collaboration with youth, declares that the young people of our county hold specific rights by virtue of their age and stage of mental and social development. These rights include the opportunity of every young person to:

1. They have a healthy mind, body and spirit that enable them to maximize their potential.
2. They develop a healthy attachment to a parent, guardian, or caregiver, and an ongoing relationship with a caring and supportive adult.
3. Their essential needs are met- nutritious food, shelter, clothing, health care, and accessible transportation.
4. They have a safe and healthy environment, including homes, schools, neighborhoods and communities.
5. They have access to a 21st century education that promotes success in life, in future careers and a love of life-long learning.
6. They have training in life skills that will prepare them to live independently, be self-sufficient and contribute to their community.
7. They have employment opportunities with protections from unfair labor practices.
8. They have freedom from mistreatment, abuse and neglect.
9. They have a voice in matters that affect them.
10. They have a sense of hope for their future.



MEASURE A

In November 2012, San Mateo County voters passed Measure A, a half-cent increase in the countywide sales tax for 10 years. After consultation with the public, a significant portion of Measure A funds have been dedicated to programs serving youth and families: boosting school safety, improving libraries, raising literacy and improving foster care and juvenile mental health services.

MEASURE A FUNDS:

Improve School Safety by expanding the County's School Resource Officer Program, which assigns deputies to schools to maintain a secure learning environment. School Resource Officers also provide security and crowd control for school functions, and educate students and families on crime and drug prevention.

Enhance Literacy and learning by providing \$2 million for library repairs and redesign, as well as new library facilities throughout the county.

Support Summer Reading Programs at 32 public libraries, and the San Mateo County Library Bookmobile.

Provide Early Intervention to prevent mental illness, emotional disturbance and substance abuse among children and youth. These efforts involve cooperation between the county Health System, Probation, Human Services Agency, schools and school districts.

Assist Foster Children, who are some of our county's most vulnerable residents. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) is a non-profit that trains volunteers to mentor and advocate for individual foster children. Measure A funds have increased the number of foster children served by CASA from 220 to 360.



COLLABORATIVE COMMUNITY

Collaborative communities are those that join government with businesses, schools, non-profits and community groups to tackle important social issues.

San Mateo County is committed to collaboration, and our officials routinely reach out to

community partners to guide policy on child and youth services. One important partner is the Peninsula Partnership Leadership Council, which was instrumental in creating our County's Bill of Rights for Children. The Council's mission is to create policies to meet the needs of children, youth and families in our county.

The Board of Supervisors has also created the Fatherhood Collaborative, an advisory board which aims to nurture engagement between fathers and children. The Fatherhood Collaborative is a forum to address and support the critical role that men and fathers play in the well-being of children and families. The Fatherhood Collaborative sponsors numerous public events such as the *Dad and Me* series, which includes story time in libraries, outdoor family events and swim days at pools.

County agencies also collaborate with business and non-profit agencies to provide internships and job training to disadvantaged young people. The County's Human Resources Department and the Human Services Agency jointly administer the Supported Training and Employment Program (STEP). The program provides internships and employment skills training for current, non-minor dependents or young people who have aged out of foster care.

The Human Resources Department also offers summer internships for youths who are looking to gain experience in government employment. Interns have the opportunity to gain hands-on experiences in a professional setting by getting paired with a mentor, receiving academic credit and/or transcript notation, and building a professional resume.

The Big Lift aims to improve the quality of existing preschool programs, and works to unify current programs with a common framework. The plan will boost access to preschool by increasing the number of spaces available. The Big Lift will provide direct financial supports to preschool classrooms for staffing, teacher planning time, and learning materials. There is also a focus on professional development for teachers including training, coaching, and incentives to complete a bachelor's degree. Facilities will be improved to provide a healthy and appropriate learning environment. The Big Lift will use an enhanced, age-appropriate curriculum to support literacy.

THE BIG LIFT

In May of 2013, the Peninsula Partnership Leadership Council (PPLC) created an initiative called The Big Lift, with the goal of increasing the percentage of third grade students who read proficiently from 58 percent to 80 percent by 2020. The four main areas of focus are: increased school readiness, better attendance, inspiring summers, and family engagement.



YOUTH COMMISSION

In 1993, the Board of Supervisors created the San Mateo County Youth Commission. The Youth Commission strives to address issues affecting youth in San Mateo County through opening communication between adult and youth perspectives, and giving youth an opportunity to share their ideas, work and passion. The Youth Commission works to close this communication gap with an annual Youth Conference, which provides youth with an opportunity to lead workshops for youth and adults on important topics.

SAN MATEO COUNTY YOUTH COMMISSION IMMIGRANT YOUTH COMMITTEE

The San Mateo County Youth Commission Immigrant Youth Committee seeks to explore the issues that arise in the immigrant youth community and provide a forum for youth to voice these issues. The Committee serves as a liaison with existing immigrant youth groups throughout the county and tracks legislation that would impact the lives of young immigrants. The Committee also gives out an annual Immigrant Youth Award to an immigrant youth who displays great passion, dedication and determination to serve the community and overcome obstacles.



PROSPEROUS COMMUNITY



A significant portion of funds budgeted for children and youth programs are used to improve families' economic self-sufficiency. San Mateo County offers an array of programs that help parents find jobs, and ensure that the necessities of nutritious food, clothing, and shelter are met.

Some programs are aimed at preparing children for prosperous careers of their own. In 2005, the Board of Supervisors established the Innovation Fund, providing competitive grants for outstanding school programs in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). Each year, the County awards multiple grants of up to \$5,000 to fourth, fifth and sixth grade teachers doing innovative teaching in the STEM fields.

The San Mateo County Children's Fund helps to stabilize and improve the lives of low-income children and families by providing dental care, enrichment activities and other services. The Children's Fund, which was created more than three decades ago, also sponsors community-building events that bring smiles to children's faces. Toy drives, donations of Halloween costumes bring the smiles while drives for school supplies fill a critical need. One fun event is *Stuff the Bus*, where thousands of toys are collected to fill a San Mateo County Sheriff's bus, and distributed to low-income children during the holiday season.

The County's Human Services Agency (HSA) offers a wide variety of services to support the safety and well-being of children and families. Numerous services are offered through HSA to ensure that foster children find strong and stable homes, for instance.

The Agency also offers frontline services to combat child abuse. The HSA's Child Abuse Reports and Investigations Unit operates a 24-hour child abuse hotline, staffed 365 days a year. The Emergency Response Unit ensures timely investigation of serious allegations of abuse or neglect, and takes legal action when necessary.

The Agency's Family Resource Centers provide child abuse prevention and early intervention services, such as after-school activities, parent support groups and workshops, counseling, and information and referral to additional resources and services. The Adoptions Unit coordinates the adoption of court dependent children in the child welfare system. The Receiving Home is a 6-bed State-licensed shelter facility that houses youth and provides a safe, homelike facility with an array of services to stabilize foster youth who require short-term out-of-home emergency placement.

In addition, HSA helps youth aged 14 to 21 find jobs through the *Jobs for Youth* program. Staff is available to work with youth in several cities, including Daly City, San Mateo, Belmont, and Redwood City.



LIVABLE COMMUNITY

The San Mateo County Library System not only offers books to the community, it provides a safe, calm community space where children can expand their knowledge, receive help with homework, exercise their creativity and join a club – all with resources in English and Spanish. Our

Library System is a cornerstone of a livable and connected community.

In addition to providing a comprehensive collection of children's books in multiple languages, the San Mateo County Library System offers year-round services to children and youth.

Homework Assistance and tutoring for youth of all ages is offered at many library locations. The Bookmobile is a mobile library that visits schools and communities throughout the county, including unincorporated coastal communities and inland areas with limited access to a local library, with materials in English and Spanish.

Library System also provides story time, craft projects, book clubs, and puppet performances.

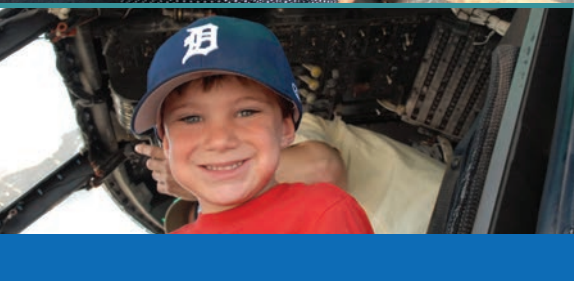
HELPNOW

The Library System's Kids website, <http://kids.smcl.org>, HelpNow provides live homework assistance online. The service is conducted seven days a week.



AIRPORT DAY

The San Carlos Airport each year hosts Airport Day, a free community event that showcases the services that the airport provides. San Carlos Airport Day draws crowds of children with airport tours, dozens of unique aircraft, food trucks, a scavenger hunt, play areas and airplane and helicopter rides. The event also inspires children to learn about flight and aviation.



ENVIRONMENTALLY CONSCIOUS COMMUNITY

The Public Works Department supports various programs and activities promoting environmental consciousness and sustainability. These activities introduce children and youth to the importance of maintaining the beauty and integrity of our shared natural environment.



The RecycleWorks Kids interactive website, <http://www.recycleworks.org/kids>, teaches children and youth how every item we use is connected to natural resources and what kids can do to sustain the environment. The website offers interactive environmental education through games, as well as listing places where children and youth can continue their learning, such as museums, parks, and recycling centers.

The Parks Department gets kids out of the house and into Nature with their *Take A Hike* series. The Saturday hikes in County Parks are an opportunity for children and youth to learn about local parks, and use the trails to stay active and healthy. The Parks Department also provides many volunteer opportunities for youth to get involved, maintain and promote county parks

Also, the Youth Commission hosts an annual Eco-Friendly Fair at County Center in Redwood City. The fair features environmentally conscious organizations, companies and individuals. Vendors from all over the Bay Area come to share in the fun of recycled, refurbished and green products and foods.



KIDS & EARTH DAY

The San Mateo County Office of Education, RecycleWorks, and the San Mateo Countywide Water Pollution Prevention Program partnered on a project to take action on Earth Day, and to involve school kids in caring for the environment. The partnership encouraged students to walk to school while picking up litter along the way, thereby reducing waste on and near the school

site while getting some exercise. All of the collected waste was weighed and categorized into two categories: waste that can and cannot be recycled. The data collected during this process was integrated into various classroom lesson plans, including having students graph the data and develop plans on how to prevent the most littered items from being littered in the future.



HEALTHY AND SAFE COMMUNITY

San Mateo County is dedicated to providing children, youth and families with access to medical care, as well as community support for healthy lifestyles.

The Health System provides numerous programs to identify needs and improve the quality of life for our community, such as the Adolescent Needs Report,

which is produced every five years in collaboration with the San Mateo County Youth Commission. This report gathers data on child and youth needs from a wide range of sources, and compiles the information into a 'snapshot' format referred to by many County agencies.

Photo Voice is another program featured by the Health System. Through partnerships with the Youth Leadership Institute, youth use photographs to record and reflect on important aspects of their community. Some of the topics participants choose to focus on include healthy lifestyles, mental health, and spirituality.

SUPPORTED TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

Synne participated in STEP (Supported Training and Employment Program), a hands-on experience for foster youth that introduces them to the world of work. She was placed in the Housing Authority and matched with a County employee who provided her with mentorship and job coaching. During the summer internship, Synne was exposed to real-life work experiences, had duties of her own and contributed to a variety of projects. She learned many new skills including expanded computer skills, general office duties, project planning and management as well as professional office conduct. With her strong willingness to learn and demonstrated abilities, Synne was offered the opportunity to stay on after the program ended. Today, Synne is employed by the Department of Housing and is majoring in film at the College of San Mateo and plans to transfer to a four-year university.

THE FAIR OAKS HEALTH CENTER

The Fair Oaks Health Center, opened in 2014, will now be able to see more than 20,000 new patients in the South County area. The clinic will serve children, youth, and families from the cities of Redwood City, Menlo Park, and East Palo Alto.



PROUD PARENTING PROGRAM

Since 2012, the Probation Department has offered the Proud Parenting Program (Proud) to young parents between the ages of 14 and 25 who have been involved in the justice system or child welfare system. The program's goal is to break the intergenerational cycle of violence and delinquency. Proud offers parent education and child development classes, parent/child activities, anger management and stress management classes, as well as treatments addressing substance abuse and antisocial behavior.



GIRLS EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

The Girls Empowerment Program (GEP) supports young women through the difficult years of adolescence and helps achieve their greatest potential.

The Girls Empowerment Program:

- Provides a safe and nurturing atmosphere which promotes educational, physical, emotional, psychological and spiritual well-being.
- Embraces diversity and promotes cultural and social awareness.
- Advocates for strong, courageous voices on a journey of self-discovery, empowerment and independence.
- Builds healthy relationships between girls.
- Offers positive adult role models and mentors.
- Engages the girl and her family as active partners in planning her community reunification.

County law enforcement agencies respond to emergencies and keep neighborhoods safe by preventing crime, accidents, and unsafe behavior.

The Juvenile Services Division of the Probation Department helps youth strengthens key developmental assets, encourages accountability and provides thorough, timely and impartial information to the Courts.

The Sheriff's Office operates programs such as Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) and Sheriff's Training and Recreation (S.T.A.R.) Camp. These programs benefit youth by educating them about gang prevention and the negative effects of substance abuse. The Sheriff's S.T.A.R. Camp is an annual event aimed at reaching out to underprivileged youths throughout our County. Sheriff's personnel and young campers trek to YMCA Camp Loma Mar for a weeklong camping trip. This trip provides the children an opportunity to experience the great outdoors and enjoy a recess from the stress of city life.

The Sheriff's Activities League (S.A.L.) helps reduce delinquency and other risk factors by creating positive connections between youth and law enforcement personnel. The S.A.L. offers many programs, including sports, mentoring, arts and dance, healthy living, leadership, and character development.

Since April 2010, 120 youth have participated in the County Coroner's Save a Life and Every 15 Minutes programs. Save a Life shows at-risk youth the consequences of unsafe behavior by visiting the morgue. Every 15 Minutes educates high school students of the dire consequences of drinking and driving.

These services provide guidance to youth and at-risk children, as well as victims of crimes, to create a healthy and successful future.



ARMANDO GARCIA played soccer with the Sheriff Activities League Academicos/S.T.A.R. program for many years. During his middle school and high school years, many of his friends began experimenting with drugs and joining gangs. Armando loved playing soccer,

which kept him distracted from negative activities. "Who knows where I would be if I had more free time to be on the streets?" Armando said. "S.A.L. gave me a safe place to go after school and taught me important values that I incorporate in my life today."



XOCHITL HERNANDEZ came to the S.A.L. program a few years ago due to her doctor's concern with her children's lack of physical activity, and the fact they were severely underweight. One of the S.A.L. donors recommended the S.A.L. Academicos/S.T.A.R. soccer program to them. Coming into the program, the children thought that they were receiving physical activity to help repair their sleeping patterns. Once in the program, they were recommended for the target mentoring program to help the family with nutrition education and the S.A.L. tutoring program to help the children

catch up in school. The boys are now at a healthy weight and even encourage their younger brother to eat his vegetables so he can be strong to play soccer. They have raised their grades and now attend a local charter school. Xochitl states that the S.A.L. programs have changed her family's lives for the better. She feels grateful for the support that S.A.L. has provided her and her family.
