



Wedding Invitation Guide

A complete guide to wording your invitations
and all the extra details to include.

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Wedding Invitations

The wording of your wedding invitations will set the tone for the wedding itself, it is vital to include all the important details and achieve a suitable level of formality in the text.

You need to make sure you include:

- Host names
- Date, time & venue for the wedding ceremony
- Details of what will follow the ceremony e.g. 'and afterwards at "a different venue" or the ceremony will be followed by the wedding breakfast and an evening reception
- RSVP details (usually a postal address, telephone number and/or email address)



Traditional Wording

Traditionally, the bride's parents would host the wedding and the invitation would come from them. An example:

Dr & Mrs T R Thomas
request the pleasure of
the company of

.....
at the marriage of their daughter
Joanne
to

Mr Richard Shaddick
at Castell Coch, Tongwynlais
on Friday, 24th August 2022
at 3.00pm
and afterwards at
The Manor Parc, Thornhill,
Cardiff

RSVP details
& reply by date

Couple Hosting

Many couples now choose to host the wedding themselves and also to use a more informal style of wording. An example:

Joanne & Richard
would be delighted if

.....
would join them to
celebrate their marriage
at
Castell Coch, Tongwynlais
on
Friday, 24th August 2022
at 3.00pm
and afterwards at
The Manor Parc, Thornhill,
Cardiff

RSVP details
& reply by date

Inclusive Wording

Alternatively, the couple might like to acknowledge both sets of parents without necessarily naming each of them.

This wording can also be adapted to 'Together with their families' for an even more inclusive feel.

An example:

Together with their parents,
Joanne Thomas
& Richard Shaddick
request the pleasure of
the company of

.....

to celebrate their marriage at
The Manor Parc Country Hotel,
Thornhill

on Friday, 24th August 2001
at 3.00pm

The ceremony will be followed by
the wedding breakfast and an
evening of music & dancing

& reply by date

Make it yours

So while traditional wedding etiquette may dictate a certain style of wording, the choice is ultimately yours.

None of these suggestions are the definitive 'right way' to word your invites. Choose something that reflects your celebration, the formality of the occasion, who is hosting and of course your personalities as a couple.

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Evening Invitations

Often the wording for your evening invitations will be based on whatever you have chosen for your wedding invitations.

Think about whether you want to keep a formal tone going throughout, or something a little more casual.

You need to make sure you include:

- Host names
- Date, time & venue for the evening reception
- RSVP details (typically a telephone number and/or email address)



Some examples

Wedding abroad?

If the evening reception is to
celebrate a wedding that is taking
place abroad you can use this
wording:

Joanne & Richard
are delighted to invite
you to join them for an
evening reception at
Callaghan's Bar, Holiday Inn,
Castle Street, Cardiff CF10 1XD
on Saturday 18th June 2022
from 7 o'clock

To celebrate their marriage which
will take place in Rhodes
on 27th May 2022

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Guest Information

A well informed guest is a happy guest! Give them all the information they need in advance to plan for your big day, for example:

- Full address (and postcode for sat nav!), and contact details for your venue(s)
- Directions of how to get there - and from church to reception venue if applicable
- Details of any transport you are providing for your guests e.g. from church to reception
- If you are marrying abroad you can include details of any group travel arrangements you have made
- Any special accommodation rates at your venue, and details on how to book
- Alternative accommodation (include options for all budgets)
- Menu choices if your guests need to pre-order
- Gift list details
- Dress code
- Arrangements for children



Gift list poems and verses

wish to give a gift, a donation towards their
honeymoon would be gratefully received.

Your presence is the only present desired.

Your loving presence in our lives is a gift...we
request no other.

Your presence is the best gift you could give us.

These are examples of some 'gift list poems',
feel free to adapt them to suit your
wedding invitation or come up with
an original poem of your own.

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Wording for 'not inviting children'

1

Regrettably we are unable to accommodate children unless they are named on the invitation.

2

We regret that due to the large number of children within our family and friends, children are not permitted. Sorry for any inconvenience caused.

3

We are sorry that we are unable to invite children to the wedding, we hope that this does not cause you an inconvenience and that you enjoy your 'day off' in our company.

4

Due to constraints at the venue, we regret that we are unable to accommodate children.

5

We would love to share our day with as many people as possible. However, due to the number of guests with young families, and because of space limitations, we regret we cannot invite children with the exception of those in the wedding party. We hope you understand and are able to make childcare arrangements where necessary.

6

Respectfully an adult occasion.

7

Due to venue limitations, it is not possible to accommodate the children of all our guests. We hope you understand and respect our wishes.

8

We're so sorry we've not been able to extend the invitation to children. There are so many parents amongst our friends and extended family, we've had to restrict it to immediate family children only. We really appreciate the arrangements you'll have to make if you are able to join us.

9

We regret that we are unable to accommodate children, outside of the wedding party. No children are invited to the evening reception....it's time to have fun!! If this causes you any major issues please talk to us.

The only children present at our wedding during the day will be our nieces. We are sorry for any disappointment this may cause.

These are examples of some text I have added to invitations previously regarding the issue of children not being invited. Feel free to use, adapt or create your own.

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Reply Cards

Your reply card (if you choose to include one) should be clear and functional. It should include:

- Accept or decline
- Space for your guests to write their names
- Any dietary requirements
- The address to return it to
- The date by which your guests should reply

Additional details that can be included are:

- Tick boxes for menu choices
- A song request for your wedding playlist
- Tick boxes or similar for any transport you are putting on
